Each year the Valley Air District creates a 13-month bilingual calendar, complete with Healthy Air Living messages and the creative artwork of Valley students from grades kindergarten through 12.

20,000 Healthy Air Living Kids' Calendars are distributed to schools, libraries, businesses and public agencies across the Valley's 8 counties. The District will select 14 artists for the 2017 edition; so get out your markers, crayons and paints and begin creating your masterpiece!

Here are some examples of Healthy Air Living messages:

- Healthy air starts with me!
- Turn off the engine while waiting to pick us up from school
- Switch to a hybrid or electric car
- Ride your bike (or skateboard or scooter)
- Use a rake or broom, NOT a leaf blower
- · Check Before You Burn
- · Use an electric lawnmower
- · Make one change for healthy air!

- BBQ with propane or natural gas
- Drive less to help clean the air

Entry Instructions

Draw a color picture that shows what we can all do to help clean our air. Drawings must be your own original artwork. Design your picture on an 8 ½" x 11" piece of white paper, turned lengthwise or horizontal.

Students must live in one of the 8 counties of the Valley Air District.

Write a clean-air message on the picture in English and/or Spanish (Bilingual entries are encouraged). Please do not use the term "Spare the Air" — Healthy Air Living has replaced that program.
