Check Before you Burn improves winter air quality

The results are in from the most recent wood-burning season, showing that once again, winter air quality continues to steadily improve with participation from Valley residents.

The Valley Air District's Check Before You Burn program concluded its seventh season on Feb. 28, with a 57 percent decrease in the number of "unhealthy" days, compared to the 2008-09 season.

The annual program restricts the use of residential wood-burning devices when air quality deteriorates in order to prevent the build-up of dangerous fine-particulate matter (PM2.5).

From November through February, wood-burning forecasts are issued each day, on a county-by-county basis that determine if open-hearth fireplaces, wood stoves and inserts, or pellet-fueled devices can be used. Tickets are issued for violations.

Since the rule's adoption by the Valley Air District in 2003, other air districts throughout California have adopted similar regulations.

"This is a great example of how we can achieve major reductions in air pollution without having to resort to cost-prohibitive regulations on businesses," said Seyed Sadredin, the District's executive director and air pollution control officer.

This rule reduces PM2.5, which has been linked to chronic lung disease, respiratory illness, heart attacks and premature death. Residential wood burning can put as much as 17 tons per day of this dangerous material into the eight-county air basin and is the largest source of particulate pollution during winter months. Surveys have shown that 70 percent of fireplace use is for ambience rather than for heating, although exemptions are available for residents who must burn wood to heat their homes.

The chart below shows the number of wood-burning curtailments declared and notices of violations issued during the 2009-10 season.
