

## **Free smog tests, some \$500 vouchers at fairgrounds Oct. 29**

The San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District and Valley Can are conducting free smog tests on Oct. 29 at the Merced County Fairgrounds from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., or until 525 cars have been tested.

Cars that fail are eligible for a \$500 voucher for repairs at a certified Gold Shield smog shop to get the vehicle smog-ready. If you have owned your car for more than six months and bought gasoline in California between 1995 and 2005, you're eligible for the program.

Food and drinks will be served for free at the event. Participants are advised to bring a current vehicle registration to verify ownership and eligibility.

## **House backs bill delaying toxic pollution controls**

WASHINGTON -- The Republican-controlled House is continuing its campaign against environmental regulations, this time passing a bill to delay rules to curb toxic air pollution from industrial boilers and incinerators.

The legislation passed 274-142 on Thursday. It joins a host of other measures aimed at weakening, delaying or scrapping EPA regulations that Republicans view as job killers.

The measures have little chance of passing the Democratic-controlled Senate. The White House has threatened to veto them.

The boiler rule would have reduced toxic emissions and mercury from more than 13,000 large boilers. Boilers burn coal and other fuels for heat and electricity.

The EPA already had cut compliance costs and delayed the rule until April 2012 due to industry criticism.
